

Board Approves \$1.37 Million in Patronage Dividends

FOR 36 YEARS AND COUNTING, MEMBERS SHARE IN CO-OP'S SUCCESS

High West Energy was founded by our members, and our continued success is only possible because of our members. It's only right that you, our members, share in that success.

At the board of directors meeting in August, the board voted unanimously to retire more than \$1.37 million in patronage dividends. This marks the 36th consecutive year High West members will receive patronage dividends, and for the 10th year in a row, the total dividend value has exceeded \$900,000.

What are Patronage Dividends?

Cooperative members share in the ownership, construction, maintenance and prosperity of the co-op. When you move into a home or establish a business in the High West Energy service territory, and when you apply for a membership, a patronage dividend account is set up in your name.

At the close of every fiscal year, any funds remaining after expenses have been paid are allocated to each member's patronage capital account based on the amount of electricity you used the previous year. The board then determines if the cooperative is financially healthy enough to retire a portion of that capital, which members receive as patronage dividends.

This year's retirement will go to people who were members in 1992, 1993, 1994 and 2020.



Did You Know?

Electric cooperatives have retired \$18 billion to members since 1988 – \$1.3 billion in 2019 alone. Because electric co-ops operate at cost, any excess revenues (called margins) are allocated and retired to members in the form of patronage dividends.

Options for Receiving Your Dividends

For all members receiving \$50 or less in dividends, the amounts will automatically be applied as bill credits later this year.

Members who are receiving more than \$50 have several choices as to how they will get their payout.



You can apply the dividend to your bill.



You can donate your patronage dividends to Operation Round Up®, an account used to offer financial support to your fellow members in a time of loss or need.



You can receive a check for the full amount in the mail.

- If you became a High West Energy member in 2020:
 You will get a check automatically, unless you call to request one of the other options listed above.
- If you received a dividend in 2020:
 You will get this year's dividend in the same way you received last year's unless you request a change.
- If you have a past-due balance:
 High West Energy will automatically credit your patronage dividend to your account.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS



If you move, please be sure to provide us with your new address so we can continue to refund patronage dividends you are eligible to receive in the future.



When a member passes away, the patronage account is available for estate retirement. A representative of the estate should contact High West Energy to settle the patronage account.

Use strong passphrases/password manager.

This may seem obvious, but all too often securing strong passphrases/password managers is overlooked. Using long, complex and unique passwords is a good way to stop your account from being hacked, and an easy way of keeping track and remembering your passwords is by using a password manager app or software.

Perform software updates.

Having the latest security software, web browser and operating system on your devices is one of the best defenses against online threats. So, don't wait—update.

Check your settings.

Be diligent to double-check your privacy and security settings and be aware who can access your documents. This extends from Google docs to Zoom calls and beyond. For meetings on Zoom, for example, create passwords so only those invited to the session can attend, and restrict who can share their screen or files with the rest of the attendees.

BUILD YOUR STORM PREP KIT TODAY

Mother Nature doesn't always give us fair warning when it comes to blizzards. Do your family a favor this month—and every October—by making sure you have the supplies you need in a secure location so the next winter storm doesn't catch you off quard.

It doesn't take very long to gather the medicine, food, water, batteries, pet supplies and other key items, but it's a lot easier to do it before you get a foot of snow dropped on your doorstep. High West Energy recommends a little proactive preparation, and you'll be happy to earn a little peace of mind knowing your family is ready in advance.



STORAGE:

Before you start building your kit, create a place in your home where it can all be stored together. This might be a closet, a spot in your basement or a couple of waterproof plastic totes.



MEDICINE

If someone in your home needs prescriptions on a regular basis, you don't want the stress of trying to get to the pharmacy when the roads are slick or maybe even impassable. Create a list of the prescriptions you need and talk to your doctor about the possibility of getting one extra month's worth in advance. Most prescriptions will last for more than a year (again, please check with your doctor), so five or six months in your storm prep kit should be fine.



FOOD AND WATER:

You might already have a good supply of canned goods and other nonperishable food in your pantry, but you should have three days' worth of food and water (one gallon per person, per day) set aside for storms.



DEVICES AND BATTERIES:

A battery-powered radio can come in handy if you can't turn on the TV to get safety updates. Flashlights (one for each person) and lanterns are also very helpful in the event of a power outage. Make sure each device has fresh batteries in it, along with a backup set.



PHONES, TABLETS AND CHARGERS:

These days, many of us get our safety updates and weather reports on our phones. If bad weather is coming, you want to make sure you charge all the phones in the house, and you can get an affordable backup battery pack to recharge those devices. If the power is out, turn off the Wi-Fi and Bluetooth settings on your devices to prolong battery life.



PET SUPPLIES:

Don't forget the four-legged members of the family! One bag of pet food won't take up much space, but you'll be so glad it's there if getting to the store for your dog or cat is just not possible.
