Winter Bill Shock How to stop the surprise high bills before they happen

ne of the most common concerns we hear from our members is a surprise high bill. There are many reasons that a bill can increase, and finding the source of a high bill can be challenging. But GCEA has tools to help you. One of these tools is an energy evaluation where we will come to your home or business and investigate potential causes of higher-thannormal usage.

Once we identify the cause of high usage, members know which steps to take to lower their usage. This may include replacing an appliance or changing settings to heating systems.

Temperatures in a breaker panel

The images below show temperatures in a breaker panel at a member's home. In the top image, you can see a breaker on the

bottom left that went to an electric heater in an attic space; the thermostat was set to almost 80 degrees. The heater had been running almost constantly for close to a year. When we shut off the attic heat, the breaker cooled down, as is shown in the image on the bottom.


Each evaluation is different, but generally includes the following:

- Review of monthly, daily and hourly usage to find changes in usage and pinpoint when the changes began
- A look around the property for items using electricity that may be the cause of high usage and taking inventory of those items to determine energy use
- Use of an infrared camera to look for warm or cold spots around a building and in the breaker panel

Reasons for high bills include:

- Pressure switches that stay on instead of turning off when water is not being used
- Electric heaters set at a higher-than-necessary temperature
- Water heaters with leaks that cause the water heater to run constantly
- Furnace fans set to run constantly instead of automatically
- Bad thermostats that keep heaters running above the set temperature
- Well or sump pumps that are failing or have failed

"We bought our first home November 2020 and received our first shocking bill in January 2021. After reviewing our daily and hourly usage through SmartHub, we were able to pinpoint the issues. With help from Energy Use Advisor Alantha Garrison, we created new habits and replaced some old appliances to help cut costs. A little bit of an upfront cost, but in the end, this has and will save us money. We also took advantage of GCEA's appliance rebate program." SmartHub

Another tool is SmartHub, where members can view their usage and identify changes in patterns. You can access your GCEA account at any time to keep on top of how you use electricity. Click on the Usage Explorer tab to view the details of your usage in monthly, daily and hourly intervals. Keeping track of when you made changes to your account (such as adding a hot tub) will help you understand how the changes affect your overall energy use. This valuable tool puts you in control of your usage and will give you a better understanding of how you use electricity.


