It goes without saying that when I wake-up on July 1 as a fully-retired former CEO of MVEA, it will take some getting used to. I have worked in the electric co-op world for over 40 years. It is what I know, and I will miss it.

Leading up to retirement, I have been asked what I will miss the most. I keep coming back to the people I have met over the years — co-op members and employees alike. Maybe it is the proud history shared of working together to bring electricity to rural communities decades ago, or maybe it is the dedication to adopting innovative technologies to better serve our growing co-op communities above and beyond keeping the lights on. When I joined MVEA in July 1996, I came from Farmers' Electric Cooperative in New Mexico where I worked in many areas of the co-op. While I had a great career at Farmers', it was an honor to be selected to join MVEA and make the move to Limon, Colorado. At the time, MVEA served over 20,000 members and more than 25,500 meters through more than 4,700 miles of energized line. And, much like today, the co-op was growing. During my

tenure at MVEA, we have grown to serve over 52,000 members and nearly 62,000 meters through more than 6,200 miles of energized line. And, behind every meter, every mile of line, and behind every new member who is welcomed, is a dedicated MVEA employee. I recently read an article about the three things that a business must have to succeed: strong financials, dedicated employees and an optimistic future. 

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You Can Make a Difference in Your Community

hat if, for only \$6 a year, you could support multiple charities, educational organizations, and your neighbor who's been struggling to make ends meet? Through Operation Round Up*, that's possible.

Operation Round Up was formed to assist charitable organizations, communities with special needs, and individuals who have suffered from loss, personal disaster or medical emergencies and it is completely funded by MVEA members who voluntarily round up their bill to the nearest dollar. The average member contribution is 50 cents a month or \$6 a year, but members never donate over \$11.88 a year. This amount may not seem like much, but when multiplied by the 26,300 MVEA accounts that are currently enrolled in the program, the fund can make a little bit of change make a BIG difference.

Out of respect for privacy, we don't name MVEA members who apply for Operation Round Up grants. We can share these funds have been vital in helping get our friends and neighbors back on their feet during the pandemic and as they continue to recover from hardships this year. Funds have kept individuals from getting evicted and have helped pay for car repairs, past due medical bills, propane for heating in the winter and more.

In addition to helping individual co-op members, the fund plays an important role in assisting charitable and educational organizations. For instance, in 2021, Emergency Incident Support is a volunteer organization that uses grant funds to provide food, shelter, rehydration and replenishment to local fire departments, HAZMAT, Wildland Fire, police, sheriffs, FBI, SWAT, Public Health, the Office of Emergency Management, Secret Service and Search and Rescue during wildland fires. Additionally, Fresh Start utilizes Operation Round Up funds for pantry food purchases and for mission-based expenses in its efforts to

end hunger and build up our community.

These are just two examples, from a long list of organizations, that put Operation Round Up funds to work for the greater good. In 2021 Operation Round Up was able to distribute more than \$142,000; in total, the program has given back over \$3.5 million since its inception in 1999.

The program is administered by a volunteer Operation Round Up Board of Directors, which is an independent board of community leaders who grant funds according to the program's policies. MVEA is not involved in the distribution or awarding of funds. Funds collected stay right here in MVEA's service territory and are used for the benefit of our members.
