Resources to Help Manage Summertime Electric Use

n March, we talked about the concept of "beating the peak" of MVEA's energy demand by spreading electric use out throughout the day, and avoiding heavy energy use during the peak demand times of 5-10 p.m. With summer right around the corner, it's a great time to put these concepts into practice and help reduce the summer peak power supply costs that affect every MVEA member. It's also a great time to look at energy-saving resources to help manage electric use.

The temperature outside has a big impact on the amount of energy that is used to control the temperature inside. Keeping the home cool as the temperatures rise, paired with having more people at home while the kids are out of school, are common causes of increased electric bills. In fact, the home cooling system is the most common culprit behind MVEA's costly summer peak energy demand.

Twenty years ago, homes with central air conditioning were the exception rather than the rule in MVEA's service territory. Today, air conditioning is a common home feature that has a big impact on summer energy use and MVEA's peak energy demand. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, nearly one-third of electric use goes toward running our heating and cooling systems.

Besides air conditioning, there are many smaller variables that can make a

big difference in the energy households consume when more people are in the home: video games, large televisions, multiple televisions, more people going inside and out, and more people using appliances.

Personally, as a member of MVEA, I'm always looking for ways I can prepare my home for the warm days ahead. This month, I want to share four resources that will make it easier to monitor your electric use and become more energy efficient — not just in the summer, but all year long.

1. Your digital meter, paired with online account management through SmartHub®, is a powerful tool to help you become more energy efficient. Wondering what the difference between having your air conditioner set at 78 degrees and 65 degrees is over a couple of days? With daily and hourly energy reads available, your digital meter and SmartHub account will help pinpoint high energy use spikes so you can avoid them in the future. 2. Explore MVEA's "Save Energy & Money" website section. Many members find the home energy calculator to be helpful in identifying high energy use sources in their home. Get started at www.mvea.coop/ save-energy-money.

3. Energy efficiency rebates help offset the cost of upgrading your home lighting, heating, cooling, and more. 

Beat the Heat 5 SUMMER ENERGY-SAVING TIPS

Easy Ways to Manage Your Summertime Electric Use

- 1. Program your thermostat to maximize energy savings. According to the Department of Energy, setting your thermostat to 78 degrees in the summer can save you up to 10% in energy costs each year. If 78 degrees is too warm, adjust it a bit lower to your comfort. The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temperatures, the lower your energy use will be.
- 2. Unplug appliances and electronics when not in use. When powered on, game consoles, televisions, and similar electronics are responsible for up to 12% of your home energy use. Plus, small appliances and electronics use energy even when they are not in use.
- **3.** Do full loads of laundry and wash with cold water. Using warm water instead of hot can cut a load's energy use in half, and using cold water will save even more.
- 4. Air dry dishes. This step can cut your dishwasher's energy use by up to 50%.
- 5. Turn off fans when you leave a room. Remember that fans cool people, not rooms, by creating a wind chill effect. Ceiling fans will allow you to raise the thermostat setting about 4 degrees without impacting your comfort.

MVEA AWARDS \$28,000 IN SCHOLARSHIPS TO LOCAL STUDENTS

s a Mountain View Electric Association member, you are part of an electric co-op that is dedicated to creating programs that give back to the members and communities that we serve. This year, students from 27 different schools throughout MVEA's 5,000-square-mile service territory applied for scholarships to help them pursue the next level of their education. MVEA's scholarship program includes scholarships to accredited colleges, universities, junior or community colleges, vocational/ technical schools, and a Power Lineman Scholarship for lineman training programs. Although there were no applicants this year, MVEA also offers a Power Engineer Scholarship to current college students pursuing a power engineering career. In addition, Tri-State Generation and Transmission and Basin Electric Power Cooperative each donated a \$1,000 scholarship to be awarded to dependents of MVEA members.



MAKE A DIFFERENCE FOR YOUR NEIGHBOR IN NEED

s the saying goes, "never judge a book by its cover." Or, in the case of Operation Round Up[®], never judge a program by its name! We've heard that some MVEA members don't quite understand what Operation Round Up (thinking it's associated with the rodeo, a barn dance, or even a super-secret spy operation). While those are good guesses, Operation Round Up is a program that supports local charities, educational organizations, and your neighbor who's struggling to make ends meet. We call it Operation Round Up, because of MVEA members who volunteer to round up their electric bill to the nearest dollar each month.

The average member contribution is 50 cents a month or \$6 per year, but members never donate over \$11.88 per year. This amount may not seem like much, but when multiplied by the over 26,000 MVEA accounts that are enrolled in the program, the fund can turn a little bit of spare change into a BIG difference.

In 2022, Operation Round Up was able

to distribute more than \$151,800 in grant funds; the program has given back over \$3 million since its inception in 1999.

Out of respect for privacy, we don't name MVEA members who apply for Operation Round Up funds, but these grants have been vital in helping our friends and neighbors recover from hardships. Funds have kept individuals from getting evicted and have helped pay for car repairs, past due medical bills, propane for heating in the winter, and other essential needs.

In addition to helping individual co-op members, the fund plays an important role in assisting charitable organizations. For instance, Fresh Start Center utilizes Operation Round Up funds for pantry food purchases and for mission-based expenses in their efforts to end hunger and build up our community. "Through the support provided by MVEA's Operation Round Up, Fresh Start Center has been able to continue to reach out and be a light of hope for many families facing hunger and poverty in the Eastern Plains of Colorado," Grant Winger,

Executive Director at Fresh Start Center said. "Without the support from Operation Round Up, we would have a much harder time providing for the many neighbors facing hunger and poverty."
