mall towns in southern Colorado face unique challenges. Often overshadowed by larger urban areas to the north, our communities rely on the strength and resilience of their local businesses to thrive.

They're the lifeblood of smalltown economies with the power to bring people together and build a strong sense of community. They serve as gathering places where residents can connect, exchange ideas, and build social networks.

To accomplish this, they need a dependable power supply to operate smoothly. Electricity supplied by San Isabel Electric Association, Inc. — their local electric cooperative — powers equipment, provides jobs, delivers your products and services without interruption, and keeps money circulating within the community.

SIEA also offers programs aimed at helping local small businesses. Programs such as rural economic development loans through the USDA and rebates for electric energy efficiency upgrades are ways we can work with you to achieve remarkable and successful outcomes for your small business. Electric cooperatives have a lot in common with small businesses. We're small when compared to traditional utilities, but not very small compared to local businesses in our communities. We provide affordable electricity to an area that spans nearly 6,600 square miles in seven counties. We have 27 substations and more than 4,600 miles of line to maintain. But, like small businesses, we operate with a small staff — SIEA serves our large area with only 84 hard-working employees. Like small businesses, we also have a local office presence. We're open five days a week in Pueblo West, Trinidad, and Walsenburg.

The last commonality isn't unique to only local or small businesses. It's a challenge the whole world has in common: The cost of everything we need to maintain our system and retain a qualified workforce is continually

increasing. Unfortunately, we anticipate the need for additional small rate increases in the coming years. However, we assure you that these increases will not significantly raise the price of electricity compared to the inflation observed in the goods and services you purchase. We will work hard to maintain the system effectively and keep your rates affordable.

Together, southern Coloradans have fostered an interconnected business ecosystem to help each other be more resilient to the adversities ahead. SIEA has created relationships with local suppliers, service providers, and other small businesses to form a strong network of support. Because of this interdependence, we rely on one another during challenging times.
