

SDCEA Participates in **Eagle Protection Program in Custer County**

he national symbol of the United States, the eagle, evokes pride and awe with its beauty. Unfortunately, accidental electrocutions resulting from contact with power lines have caused eagle mortalities throughout the country. To mitigate this issue, SDCEA has consistently upheld eagle and raptor-friendly pole construction standards.

The cooperative recently qualified for and signed an agreement with Eagle Electrocution Solutions and EDM International to retrofit 29 poles in Custer County to deploy the newest innovations in protection standards available to poles on our lines. Custer County was identified to be included in this project because it is known for its significant population of Golden eagles.

The program supports a 30-year commitment to eagle-friendly pole construction. It includes solutions like insulating wires, using perch discouragers, and employing eagle-friendly pole designs to create greater wire separation. SDCEA will collaborate with EES and EDM International for implementation.

An assessment of eagle risks and prescribed retrofitting was completed earlier this year. The retrofitting started in September and should be complete by the end of this month. After the installation is completed by SDCEA, an inspection will be done by EES. When all inspections are complete, SDCEA will receive financial compensation for retrofit costs. A program sponsor will conduct pole monitoring and inspections every 10 years to ensure ongoing bird protection.

"SDCEA's efforts to participate in eagle protection demonstrate SDCEA's commitment to our concern for wildlife and for the environment," interim CEO Gary Kelly said. "We look forward to partnering with EES and EDM in this program."

SDCEA linemen practice pole-top rescue techniques in the event they need to come to the aid of an injured coworker.









Safety of our employees and the public is SDCEA's utmost priority. Recently, crews participated in annual pole-top rescue drills.

PRACTICING POLE-TOP RESCUE

racticing pole-top rescue is a crucial safety procedure in the electrical industry and a vital skill for linemen. A pole-top rescue would be performed when a lineman becomes unconscious or unresponsive and is unable to independently descend a pole they are working on or from. Common factors requiring pole-top rescue include electrical shock, heart attack, heat stroke, physical injury, and equipment failure.

SDCEA linemen practiced pole-top rescue recently with a life-size and weight orange form. Their practice drill involved as quickly as possible calling in the emergency and preparing to climb a pole from the ground to perform knot work and safely lower the form. Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

The holiday season is upon us, and that means we'll be using more energy in the kitchen. When possible, cook with smaller countertop appliances instead of the stovetop or oven. Smaller appliances such as slow cookers, air fryers, and Instant Pots consume less energy than larger appliances.

When using the oven or stovetop, match the size of the pot to the heating element and place a lid over the pot while cooking. The food will cook faster, and you'll use less energy.
