

Win a trip to Washington, D.C.,

or a week at Leadership Camp at Glen Eden Resort!

Each year, Southeast Colorado Power Association (SECPA) sponsors two students to attend the Washington D.C. Youth Tour held June 17-23, 2024. High school students who are 16 by June 1 AND WHOSE FAMILIES ARE SECPA MEMBERS are eligible to apply to go on the trip. Youth Tour provides students with an eight-day adventure that offers in-depth exposure to the electric cooperative network while exploring our nation's Capital. The selected student's expenses — including airfare, lodging, meals and all tour admission fees — are paid for by SECPA. Activities during the trip include tours of the U.S. Capitol, the Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial, war memorials, Arlington National Cemetery, the National Archives, the White House and several Smithsonian Museums. A Potomac River dinner and dance cruise, visits with Colorado's U.S. senators and representatives, and the chance to connect with students nationwide are also part of the experience.

If you're not chosen to attend the Washington, D.C., trip, you may be the recipient of a trip to Leadership Camp held at Glen Eden Resort, located just outside of Steamboat Springs. At this camp, held July 13-18, 2024, students from Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Wyoming gather at a beautiful resort on the Elk River and spend the week at an outstanding leadership camp. Students participate in activities to improve leadership skills. There is also time for swim parties, barbecues, whitewater rafting, and dancing. Many of the attendees call this camp a "life-changing experience."

## Cooperation Among Cooperatives Helps Bring Gigabit Internet to a Small Rural School District

n 1998, the Southeast Colorado Power Association Board of Directors voted to form Southeast Communications, or SECOM, as a division of SECPA to create a new fiber optic communications network in southeastern Colorado. This network was created to bring high-speed digital communications capabilities to the rural areas of southeastern Colorado because the directors saw a need that no other communications companies were willing or able to provide in the area at that time — much like the original founders of SECPA did back in 1937 when they formed the cooperative under the Rural Electrification Act to bring electricity to these same unserved parts of southeastern Colorado.

Fast-forward to today — SECOM is now a wholly owned subsidiary of SECPA and has grown well outside the SECPA service territory. SECOM began working with the Primero School District in Weston, Colorado, back in 2019 when the school reached out looking for options to bring high-speed internet access to the school and its 186 students. Weston and Primero School are 23 miles west of Trinidad (SECOM's nearest fiber connection) up Highway 12, also known as the Highway of Legends National Scenic Byway. SECOM was up for the challenge and began the process of designing and building a high-speed network capable of multi-gigabit speeds to serve the school. The build included attaching fiber optic cable to nearly 10 miles of overhead electric lines owned by fellow electric cooperative San Isabel Electric Association. \*WIN Lillian Laney, acct 2302670002

There were many delays due to COVID-19 and the resulting supply chain issues, but in early 2023, construction began with the goal of completion in July before the start of school in August. When SECOM performed the initial engineering studies, results showed that many of the poles would need to be replaced with taller poles to maintain the required clearances. When talking to SIEA's engineering and operations staff, it was discovered that most of the taller poles were backordered for at least three to four months. After SIEA and SECPA were unsuccessful in trying to source these poles from alternate vendors sooner, it seemed like the project was stalled again.

That's when SECPA/SECOM Chief Executive Officer Kevin Brandon and SECOM Chief Operations Officer Scott Monarco arranged a lunch meeting with SIEA CEO Ryan Elarton to brainstorm ideas to help move the project along, such as the possibility of SECPA crews helping SIEA crews if needed, due to an already heavy workload for SIEA crews. Elarton was very supportive of SECOM's efforts, and very much wanted the project to succeed. He commented that the school and its students and staff were San Isabel Electric members, and he was excited about the learning possibilities that having quality internet access would provide.

"We are proud to be part of our local communities and to work together with our neighbor electric co-op SECPA/SECOM to bring fiber to the students and staff at Primero School" Elarton added.

After the meeting, the SECOM and SIEA engineering teams continued to meet and develop creative solutions to allow the construction to continue and still meet all the clearance requirements without having to wait three to four months for poles. As

it worked out, SIEA already had work crews in the area completing a project and could move right on to the work required to prepare the poles for the SECOM fiber.

Much of this build on SIEA's lines was across beautiful but rugged terrain that required fiber crews to climb the poles, carrying the fiber cable and hardware up with them, because much of the route was not accessible by bucket truck. Bill Larkin, owner of Starfire Communications (SECOM's construction partner on the project) quipped, "I need to thank SECOM — I'm in the best shape I've been in for years after having to climb all these poles."

In the end, SECOM had a few more delays in obtaining the required highway crossing permits but has now completed the project, and the staff and students at Primero School are enjoying dedicated gigabit internet access ... something not available at many larger schools. Primero School Superintendent Jeanine Duran stated that they are operating much better since getting fiber internet in their district. "We just don't seem to be getting calls about the service being out, and we're very happy," she said.



SECPA and SECOM are grateful for all the help from SIEA in making this project a reality. This is just one example of how cooperative principle number six, "cooperation among cooperatives" helps improve the lives of our members.

Director elections are for three-year terms, beginning April 2024 and ending March 2027 for District seats 2 and 6. The District 5 seat will complete the remainder of the term ending March 2026.
